Re: 'Network Archaeological Open-air Museums'

Dear Friends and Colleagues,

During many conversations in the in crowd of colleagues, it became clear, that often the wish was expressed for more communication and coordination between archaeological open-air museums. On the other hand, organizations like universities and experimental groups play a significant role as well in the educational and experimental archaeological world. These considerations have led to an initiative of forming an international network in this field.

The subscribers have had different meetings in March and made a list with some issues that could be part of an experimental & educational Network in Europe.

With a network, information could be compiled and spread. Subjects could be

- (Archaeological) science and the conversion to the public;
- Experiences on (pre-) historic techniques;
- Education (for both children and adults);
- Public Relations and marketing;
- All over management;
  - Et cetera.

A Network could involve spreading information and know how, but could for example also involve the exchange of specialists.

One of the focal points could be a website with external and internal information, with access restricted to members. We could use e-mail lists for fast exchange of information, questions and answers, activities, and the like.

One of the activities of the Network could be the (annual) organization of conferences on several subjects, like for example:

- Standardization of criteria of quality of experimental and educational archaeology in general;
- Concepts of archaeological open air museums;
- Round table conference on constructing and documenting (burnt) houses;
- Educational programs for teenagers and grown ups.
- Training / schooling of educational staff and handicraft people

In the initial phase, it is suggested to start on a low profile basis. If proven successful, there are possibilities to extend the network to a larger, European scale. This would demand more input, both concerning finances and organization, but could also provide spectacular results. However, the possibility and realization of extension will depend on the results of the initial phase.

It is clear that the initial concept of open air museums as it was formed around 30 years ago, needs certain revision and has to be adapted to modern times. Therefore, we would like to discuss the experiences of various museums, gained over the last 30 years, during a three days meeting in Germany. One of the main objectives of the conference will be to form a common, shared idea of a strategy for the future, based on positive and negative results of the past.

The meeting will take place in the village of Oerlinghausen, near Bielefeld and will be hosted by the Archäologisches Freilichtmuseum (AFM) Oerlinghausen. If you whish more information in order to participate, please write to the secretary address below.

This letter is sent to about twenty different museums, in approximately fifteen European countries. Next to this, a small number of other organizations are contacted as well. A list of addresses is enclosed. We ask you to reply with a letter of intent, hoping you will see the necessity of such a network and the possibilities of what we could accomplish together. We invite you to add your own ideas or hesitations on this subject. We kindly ask you to react before December 20th 2000. Please, feel free to inform your colleagues about this project.
