


NUMBERS AND STATISTICS




- ✓ The number of EXARC members rose last year from 295 to 315.

looking back at 2018


- ✓ We got 39 new members but we also lost 19 members in 2018.

■ lost members




✓ EXARC members are evenly spread over Europe, with also a strong presence in North America, which decreased a bit in 2018.






SESSIONS ON EXARC.NET AND TDAR





EU Project - CRAFTER

- ✓ CRAFTER is part of the Creative Europe programme and connected to the 2018 European Year of Cultural Heritage.
- ✓ Timeline: 1 July 2018 31 December 2019
- ✓ A partnership of eight organisations from five European countries: Spain, the Netherlands, Germany, Hungary and Serbia.



- ✓ CRAFTER recreates Bronze Age ceramics and stages an exhibition.
- ✓ EXARC's task is helping with dissemination.
- ✓ EXARC's budget: € 6,178 of which € 1,500 own input.







FINANCES 2018

- 1. We raised the fees in 2018, which explains € 5,000 more income.
- The work on website was a large part of our budget (average € 6,000 a year). In 2018 we finished this 3 years project, and the costs from 2019 are back to normal.
- The conferences costs vary per year depending on how large conference we organise.
- 4. There were more travel costs in 2018, also due to the CRAFTER project (€ 1,400). We had 2 main conferences: Paleofestival and in Kernave (over € 2,000 in costs).
- 5. Office costs are high in 2018. The director abstained from half of his volunteer fee and got a laptop instead.

FINANCES 2019-2020



- EAC11 was a huge post in 2019, forming 40% of our revenues. The costs of the conference are booked onder different posts, that is why PR costs are quite high in 2019 (€ 3,000 more than in other years).
- 2. Our PR campaign includes sending Digest to all Universities doing EA and AOAMs who are not our member yet (€ 2,000).
- 3. We started with Twinning in 2019, the costs are € 2,000, other travel costs include attendence at EAC11.
- 4. We are part of CRAFTER until end 2019; several costs under PR Website (€ 1,150), part of Digest (€ 650) and some travels are paid by the EU.
- 5. The numbers are conservative and do not include possible extra income from EU projects. It is based on a growth with 15 members a year.




looking back and at near future

- Over the years 2011-2016 our reserves grew from € 4,700 to almost € 11,500. We were able to save some costs during our EU projects and generated more income with sales and donations.
- However, renewing the website (2016-2018) was very expensive.
 This brought our reserves down to € 7,250.
- 3. Our reserves are again increasing, up to € 10,000 in 2021.
- 4. We introduced **Twinning** and are working on different EU applications.
